

# Cantor Riselle Bain's Message September 2024 / 5784

As I write this newsletter article, I am also preparing to be interviewed tomorrow by Alan Mason PhD. of Miami. He is teaching a musical theatre class, and one class will focus on the 60th Anniversary of the eternally heartwarming musical, *Fiddler on the Roof.* Years ago, I was cast as Hodel for Sacramento Civic Opera's production of *Fiddler*. My Tevye was the great Metropolitan Opera singer and Cantor, Jan Peerce.

The original Broadway production of *Fiddler on the Roof* opened at the Imperial Theatre in New York City on September 22, 1964. The musical ran until February 25, 1967. That production was a critical and commercial success, winning nine Tony Awards, including Best Musical, and running longer than any other musical in Broadway history at the time.

I asked myself, after 60 years, what meaning can this musical have for Jews and others today? What is the significance of the fiddler on the roof?

As I recall, the Fiddler is a metaphor for survival in a life of uncertainty, precarious as a fiddler on a roof "trying to scratch out a pleasant simple tune without breaking his neck." The fiddler also represents that tradition that Tevye sings of in the opening number, the traditions that Tevye is trying so hard to live by.

Tevye is a Jewish milkman in early 20th century Russia who struggles to maintain his traditions while navigating his daughters' choices for love and the Czar's edict to evict Jews from their village. My grandfather – Hyman Cohen grew up in a little shtetl – Kletzk – located in Belarus. He ran away from his home and came to the United States in order to escape being conscripted into the Czar's army. For a Jewish boy, the Czar's army surely meant death.



*Fiddler* is set in imperial Russia, at a time when that encompassed parts of Ukraine, Lithuania, Moldova, and sundry other countries. The "pale of settlement," established by Catherine the Great in 1791, was the area where Jews were allowed to live. Jews no longer live in the Pale of Settlement, which was abolished in 1917.

The story focuses on tradition, family, love, what it means to be brutalized as a people and to become refugees. These are all parts of life that we continue to see happening in today's times. Unfortunately, anti-semitism is alive and well in the United States and throughout the world. The *Fiddler* story evokes parallels between the tragedies Jewish communities and other peoples have faced historically and recently.

It is also about young women using the power of their voices to ask for what they want. My character, Hodel, was very rebellious in a lot of ways. She speaks her mind and uses wit and her heart to express her truths.

The story and the words still ring true, even after 60 years, "Without our traditions, our lives would be as shaky as a fiddler on the roof!"

Continued prayers for Israel and all of the hostages their families and the world!


Continued Prayers Mi Shebeirach for all those who are recovering and healing.


