On December 31st, we will be celebrating the beginning of the New Year 2026 in our Gregorian calendar. I found myself wondering what is the difference for us Jews between celebrating the secular New Year and our Spiritual New Year – Rosh Hashanah? I also asked myself, “What is in store for us at Temple Israel in this New Year?”

The secular new year, which follows the modern Gregorian calendar, is celebrated on the first day of January. [Rosh HaShanah](#), literally meaning the “head” of the year, follows the Hebrew calendar, a lunar-solar calendar. Its celebration begins on the first day of the Hebrew month of [Tishrei](#) (which usually falls in September or October).

Our secular New Year’s Eve celebration will be filled with merriment, feasting, fireworks, and making resolutions.

Our Rosh HaShanah holy day has a more serious and solemn tone. The noise for us is the blowing of the [shofar](#) in temple to mark the beginning of the Ten Days of Awe, that period of soul-searching reflection which concludes on [Yom Kippur](#), our Day of Atonement, and a day of fasting (maybe!). The Talmud teaches that God determines who will live and who will die in the year to come on Yom Kippur. May we all live and be healthy.

On December 31st, we will say to each other “Happy New Year!” On Rosh HaShanah, we greet one another with "Shanah tovah" (a good year) or "Shana tovah umetukah" (a good and sweet year). Then we add the greeting from Rosh HaShanah through Yom Kippur, "g'mar chatimah tovah", “May you have a good final sealing in the Book of Life.”



How many of us know the words to the popular secular New Year's Eve song is "Auld Lang Syne," based on a poem written in 1788 by the national poet of Scotland, Robert Burns? Some of us will be singing it at the stroke of midnight to bid farewell to the old year.

Perhaps the most recognizable prayer melody sung in synagogues on Rosh HaShanah is "Avinu Malkeinu," a plea to God for compassion, forgiveness, and blessing. On the eve of Yom Kippur, we sing "Kol Nidrei".

Whether we talk about New Year's resolutions or t'shuvah, returning to the path of righteousness, we can all benefit from taking a pause to consider where we have been in our lives, where we want to go, and how we plan to get from here to there.

At Temple Israel, we will continue to build the warmth of community and friendship as we celebrate, Shabbat, enjoy a yearly concert, laugh ourselves silly at Purim, gather together for Passover, Yom Hashoah and Yom Haatzmaut. Never a dull moment always filled with goodness and caring.

History of our Czechoslovakian Holocaust Torah

At Temple Israel of Highlands County in Sebring, we are privileged and honored to be guardians of Czech Memorial Scroll #409. It was written in 1890. The tragedy of this extraordinary scroll is that it is the only surviving relic of the Prostejov Jewish community whose members were deported and exterminated in the Nazi death camps during World War II. Every time we read from our Torah #409, we honor the lost lives of our extended mishpacha – our extended Jewish family who lived in Prostejov until the Holocaust wiped them out.

What is the history of our precious Holocaust Torah. Our Temple Israel Torah scroll #409 comes from the town of Prostejov which is right over the border from Vienna in the Czech Republic. This scroll and others like it with its biblical teachings, was used by Jewish communities to guide their conduct and values. It is one of 1564 scrolls which were gathered into an unused synagogue in Prague after World War II. Twenty years later the Communists, who had taken over Czechoslovakia, needing hard cash, sold the scrolls to an art dealer in London who worked with a rabbi to repair them.

What was Prostejov like for the Jews who lived there before it was decimated by the Germans?

Indeed, Prostejov was for centuries home to one of the most significant Jewish communities in the eastern part of the country known as Moravia. The Jewish philosopher Edmund Husserl was born here, and his relatives were buried at the town's Jewish cemetery, as were family members of celebrated author Stefan Zweig.

History of our Czechoslovakian Holocaust Torah, cont.

The local Jews used the cemetery from 1801 until the beginning of the 20th century. Before the Nazis took over, the Jewish community rejected proposals from City Hall to sell the site. After the transport to the Terezin concentration camp of nearly all the town's 1,442 local Jews, as well as 250 others who came as refugees, the Jewish graveyard was doomed to destruction. Only some 200 of those sent to Nazi camps survived the Holocaust, and most of them left the country to live in Israel and elsewhere. Today, there are less than a dozen Jews living in Prostejov.

Confronting the dark legacy of the Holocaust, in 2015, a small team of researchers began working to reassemble the Jewish cemetery in the eastern city of Protsjov that was destroyed during the Nazi occupation. The Nazi death machine killed 6 million Jews in the Holocaust, wiping out a third of world Jewry - and didn't even let those already dead rest in peace.

The Once Lost Jewish Graveyard in Prostejov, Czech Republic, was finally being reassembled. A small team of researchers began looking for 1,924 tombstones that were destroyed by the Nazis circa 1943.

The renovation project was spearheaded by New York philanthropist Louis Kestenbaum (whose father Rabbi Zvi Kestenbaum was active in lobbying for the creation of the U.S. Commission for the Preservation of America's Heritage Abroad) and Tomas Jelinek who led the search for "Prostejov's lost graveyard." Louis Kestenbaum first drew attention to the cemetery when he was looking for the tomb of the Prostejov Rabbi Zvi Horowitz, who died in 1816.

"His (Rabbi Horowitz's) writings are still revered in Jewish communities throughout the world," Kestenbaum told The Associated Press by email. "For Rabbi Horowitz and other great rabbis from the region, Prostejov was known as a major seat of Jewish learning and culture. This makes the cemetery an important monument in both Jewish and Czech history."

Among the project's earliest discoveries is of a Jewish tombstone that was repurposed and used as a hen house doormat in the small village of Žešov. Turned upside down and after a bit of cleaning, the tombstone found at the entrance to the henhouse revealed a Hebrew inscription that was hidden for decades. Bearing the name Juli Rosenthal, it reads: "Here lies a modest and righteous woman, Mrs. Yittel, the wife of our dear teacher Mr. Leib Rosenthal, may he be long alive, who passed away 76 years old."

Another discovery was a whole backyard of a house in Prostejov that was paved with some 50 large tombstone blocs. One Prostejov resident, Anna Holestova, said she moved to her grandmother's home 25 years ago, and was told that her grandfather brought the stones there since they were given out for free during the war.

Using archival material from the Jewish Museum in Prague, the team of tombstone trackers were able to attach identities to some of the stones found. All 1,924 tombstones were desecrated, likely in 1943, and no documents were available to clarify their fate.

History of our Czechoslovakian Holocaust Torah, Cont.

The search for a site that disappeared such a long time ago in the wartime chaos looked like mission impossible at the beginning, said Tomas Jelinek. "At the start, we had no clue, experts knew nothing," he said. "But we thought that it was impossible for such a big number of stones, and some of them were quite big, to completely evaporate without a trace."

That hunch was proven right after they published an announcement about the project in a City Hall newspaper. The team didn't have to wait long for responses from people with information about stones they had in their homes, or tips on where they could be found.

Preserved plans and details of the cemetery, including the inscriptions stored at the archive of Prague's Jewish Museum, make it possible to identify the people they belonged to. Their living relatives now have an unexpected chance to rediscover their family past - previously considered lost forever.

Our Sefer Torah #409 is a permanent memorial to those martyrs – their lives and their legacy were blotted out, just because they were Jewish. Our Torah is filled with their blessed memories.
